"Evangelism" is the theme for the Christian Ministry conference to be held at Fort Wayne Bible College February 28 to March 2. The conference, which may become an annual workshop on the campus, is being planned as the result of the fine interest shown in last year's Christian Ministry emphasis, which was one of the weeks of the college's 50th anniversary year.


The conference sessions will be centered in the area of evangelism for the local church. Participating lecturers, together with their topics, are as follows: Rev. Jack H. Wart, pastor of the Campbell Baptist Church, Windsor, Ontario — "Sunday School Evangelism"; Rev. Russell R. Kauffman, pastor of the Hope Christian and Missionary Alliance Church, Indianapolis, Ind. — "Missionary Evangelism"; J. Francis Chase, commercial artist and Christian layman, Chicago, Ill. — "Evangelism Through Publicity"; and a speaker for the evening sessions who will be announced soon.

The conference is under the supervision of the department of pastoral training. Cyril H. Eicher, assistant professor of pastoral training and dean of students, is chairman of the planning committee.

The conference is geared especially for pastors, Christian workers and interested laymen. There will be a registration fee, and room and board will be available at moderate costs. Detailed announcements of the conference will follow in subsequent issues of the Vision.

Second Dollar-Day Yields \$504.10 To Fund

A more-than-a-dollar average was once more realized on the second D-Day held at the college on November 21. A total of \$504.10 was reached as students and staff again contributed to the building fund by means of the dollar-day event.

The first such occasion, reported fully in the November Vision, was held on October 24 and also brought more than \$500. The project demonstrates the faith and vision of the college family in promoting the building project of the college.

Ambassadors Win, Lose To Grace

A pair of exchange basketball games with Grace Theological Seminary of Winona Lake, Ind., brought a win and a loss for the Ambassadors in the first two games of the college's current varsity net schedule.

Playing in the Zion Lutheran gym in Fort Wayne on November 19, the Ambassadors defeated Grace 84-53. The return game in Warsaw, Ind., on December 3 saw the tables turned as Grace defeated the local five 78-59.

Traveling to Huntington, Ind., on December 6, the Ambassadors chalked up another win when they defeated the Huntington College junior varsity 74-59.

Exchange games will also be played with Detroit Bible Institute. The game in Detroit is scheduled for January 14, with the home game in Fort Wayne on January 21.

Band Added to Growing Activities of Music Department

Perhaps one of the newest additions to the growing curriculum of Fort Wayne Bible College is the college band, which is fast becoming an established organization of the music department. Under the direction of Lansing Bulgin, director of the School of Music, the band was organized at the beginning of this school year as a part of the recently added music education features of the College.

According to the Indiana State Department of Public Instruction, which has accredited the college for teacher training in public school music, instruction in both vocal and instrumental music must be a regular part of the curriculum in the School of Music. Along with the band, private teaching in brass, woodwinds, and strings has also been strengthened this year with the help of part-time instructors from local schools and music circles.

Since its beginning this fall, the band has performed only for basketball games. However, Mr. Bulgin is planning to present the band in a program by itself or as a part of a music department concert. The band's repertoire consists primarily of marches — some of them using well-known hymn tunes. It is also rehearsing a portion of the Fifth Symphony by Dvorak, known as "The New World Symphony". Other literature soon to be added will include band transcriptions of chorale tunes by Bach.

Members of the group are as follows: Jonathan Steiner and Delmar Caulkins, 1st cornet; Orville Schlatter, 2nd cornet; Nancy Brown, 3rd cornet; Rochelle Leichty, oboe; Bill Keinlein, alto saxophone; Shirley Reel, tenor saxophone; Janice Burr, French horn; Paul Weidner, baritone; William Paul, trombone; Floyd Brick, sousaphone; Scott Merryman, snare drum; and Milton Sinn, bass drum.

In explaining the importance of the band and its place in helping to fulfill the objectives of the college, Mr. Bulgin states: "A trained performance for instrumental music in the church is as important as the fine presentation of choral music. Both express the experience and witness of the Christian life and therefore provide a medium for Christian ministry in the total church program. The band is helping our students develop their talents in instrumental music for God's use."

"Thou Shalt Guide Me With Thy Counsel" . . .

W. Morrow Cook Dean of Men

"When can I make an appointment with you?" The look on the student's face, and the tone in his voice, communicated to me the impression of seriousness, earnestness, and purposefulness. The question was obviously prompted by a deep sense of need, and even of urgency. It was a crisis, and much seemed to depend on the decision about to be made. It affected the student's present life in the college, and the plan of his future life and ministry. The appointment was made, and the counseling-interview took place.

The problem was viewed from all possible angles and aspects. How could we know the Lord's will in this particular case? Can we safely follow our own desires? Did he possess the necessary qualifications? Shall it be service at home or in some foreign land? As we talked, and later prayed, light dawned, the load was lifted, and assurance given as to the Lord's will and way.

Problems! All have problems of one kind or another. They may be personal, moral, social, spiritual, financial, intellectual, emotional, or academic. They are not always easy to unravel or solve. Students are not different from other areas of community life. The teen-age period is not less, but probably more fraught with difficulties than other periods of life. Here at Fort Wayne Bible College, an attempt is always made to provide such a permissive atmosphere that the student will share his concern and tell his trouble, and get the right kind of guidance.

This kind of counseling is our privilege, joy, and responsibility, as God gives wisdom.
