Nick Hayden g03 published *The Unremarkable Squire* in 2013 with Barking Rain Press. While working full-time at his family's business, Hayden Honda, in Kendallville, Ind., he also has self-published more than a dozen novels and short story compilations. Along with publishing books, Nick discusses writing on a podcast called "Derailed Trains of Thought," with **Timothy Deal g06 TU**. He also started an online story series called *Children of the Wells*, which he writes with Tim, **Nathan Marchand g06**, and his wife **Natasha (Fast) Hayden g04**. He also updates his blog regularly at worksofnick.com.

Heather (Neilson) Burgette g04 is an adjunct professor at Indiana Tech, where she teaches college reading and writing, English composition, and business courses. She recently published an article in *GLO Magazine*, ran a regular blog for Fort Wayne's Smallest Winner this past summer, and is in talks with

Discovery House regarding a book on her journey out of debt.

Maura (Klopfenstein) Oprisko g04 wrote a guest column for the *Journal Review* in Crawfordsville, Ind., which led to a year-long regular column on special diets from 2012-13. In April 2014, two of Maura's stories appeared in *Chicken Soup for the Soul: Raising Kids on the Spectrum*. She's also written for healthline.com and is currently writing a book on autism in the church.

Personal Challenge Leads to Professional Writing Major Hundreds Continue Making Impact for Christ

What started as a personal challenge in the professional writing career of **Dr. Dennis Hensley h08** has resulted in the realization of hundreds of students' and alumni's publishing dreams.

When Dr. Hensley turned 48, he had accomplished all the career goals he had set for himself. He'd published best-selling books, both fiction and nonfiction. He'd sold articles to dozens upon dozens of Christian and secular publications. He'd earned his doctorate in English, and he'd been a keynote speaker and workshop leader at numerous writers' conferences.

But when then-Taylor University president **Dr. Jay Kesler g58** approached him in the fall of 1996 about starting a professional writing program on the Fort Wayne campus, "Doc," as his students and friends call him, decided to accept a new challenge.

"For the first three years, I taught World Literature, American Literature, Expository

Writing, Business and Technical Writing, and Specialty Writing seminars while I designed and test-marketed the new writing courses," he said. "By 2000 we had more than 35 students designated as Professional Writing majors within the TUFW English department, and by then I had instituted courses in Fiction Writing, Freelance Magazine Writing, Basic Reporting, Corporate Communications, and other new writing courses."

In the beginning years of the program, the Professional Writing major was under the TUFW English department. Doc taught most of the writing courses. **Dr. Pam Jordan g78** taught English Literature classes, and Kathryn Chevraux-Ludwig worked as a part-time professor in the English department.

Doc began hiring professional authors to teach J-term writing seminars. The first author to teach over J-term was Bob Hostetler (*They Call Me AWOL*) in 2002. Other guest teachers included Cecil Murphey (*90 Minutes in Heaven*), Bill Myers (*McGee and Me*), Lin Johnson (editor of *Christian Communicator* and *Church Libraries*),

Holly G. Miller (senior editor of *The Saturday Evening Post*) and the late David Pierce (short story crime writer for numerous mystery magazines).

The Professional Writing program grew exponentially over the years. In the first year, just three girls had signed up for the major. In 2009 Professional Writing had 89 full-time enrolled majors — as well as 41 students taking professional writing courses online.

When Doc was teaching on the Fort Wayne campus, he and his wife, Rose, enjoyed getting to know each of his students personally. Every year they would invite students to their home for dinner and board games — his favorite being “Humm...ble,” a game in which the students would have to guess what song each person was humming.

“Also, Rose and I were able to house a lot of the visiting parents of prospective students, which allowed us to get close to their families,” Doc said.

He misses having non-traditional students in his classes. When he taught on the Fort Wayne campus, many older students who already had established careers took professional writing classes. That mix of traditional students (ages 18 to 22) and non-traditional students (ages 28 to 70) offered a

wide range of life experiences from which to write and learn.

Since the Professional Writing major has moved to Taylor, it has continued to grow.

As the professional writing department continues to succeed, Dr. Hensley looks toward the future. “I am now 66 years old, so I will probably teach only three more years,” he said. “In that time, I want to put in place solid professors who know my philosophy of teaching writing skills and who have the experience to keep my department thriving. I want to see the Department of Professional Writing continue to produce outstanding Christian writers who are making an impact for the cause of Christ in all areas of communication.”

Doc said his goal is for his students to find areas in professional writing where they can make a good living and enjoy their work.

“Some go into magazine writing and editing, some go into newspaper reporting, some become radio or TV or movie scriptwriters, some become editors at publishing houses, some become literary agents, and some become public relations writers,” he said. “As they enjoy their work and succeed at it, I feel I have done my job.”

Dawn (Renkenberger) g00 Crandall Publishes Christian Romance Trilogy

Dawn (Renkenberger) Crandall g00 never thought she'd write for a living. But 14 years after she graduated with a Christian Education degree from TUFW, Dawn has her first two novels out and one more on the way. Even now, she finds her recent success unbelievable.

"When people would tell me, 'Dawn, you have an agent. You're a real writer,' I'd say, 'I don't know why you think that, because I'm not.'" Her humility comes from her unlikely road to publishing.

Dawn became a Christian when she was a junior in high school and eventually decided to attend TUFW for Christian Education, mainly to learn more about the Bible. The Professional Writing program wasn't offered until Dawn's junior year, and by that time, she felt she was too far into her program to switch.

Although she didn't take many writing classes, Dawn discovered some of her favorite novels and studied them in her own free time.

"I was introduced to Jane Austen, *Jane*

Eyre, Charles Dickens, and found more books I liked," she said. "I wanted to see how each book was constructed. Then I'd just dig into it and figure out why I loved it and why other people loved it."

She doesn't believe that any particular class or professor at TUFW contributed to her love of books or writing. But, she said,

"I do think that my majoring in Christian Education and focusing on the spiritual formation of what it means to be a Christian really helped me in the long run with understanding the spiritual growth and journey of my main characters, which I write from first-person point of view."

After she graduated, she married Jon Crandall, and they moved to Indianapolis. Dawn spent most of her free time at the library. One day, in 2005, she came home with a pile of writing books.

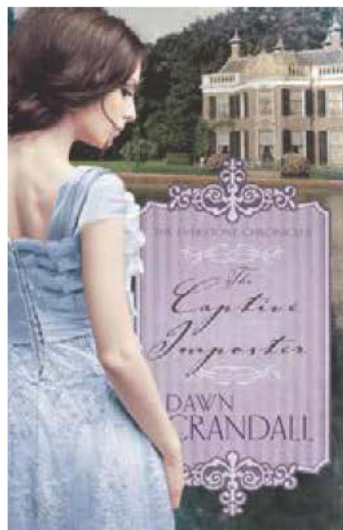
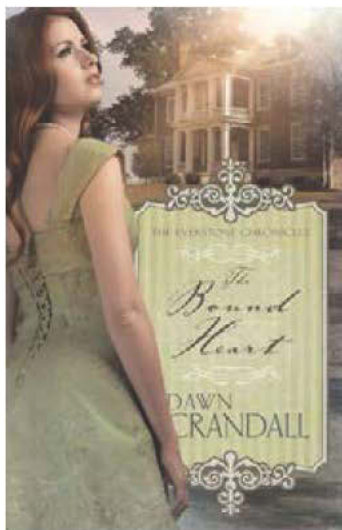
"Jon sees all these books on developing plot and characters and says, 'I didn't know you wanted to write a book. You should do it!'" Dawn recalled.

She finally got the courage to write her first novel, *The Hesitant Heiress*, 10 years after graduating from TUFW and five years after her husband encouraged her to write.

Seventy-five percent through her novel, Dawn got stuck. She felt like her ending was

way too long. So she took a break from it and started working on another novel for National Novel Writing Month. That novel was the start to the second book in her *Everstone Chronicles* series.

“I took a character from my first book and wrote the second book from her perspective,” Dawn said. “The plot was all set, and I wrote 50,000 words in a month.”

Then Dawn decided she needed to connect with other writers. Her husband encouraged her to attend the American Christian Fiction Writers (ACFW) Conference. Dawn eventually got a publishing deal through Whitaker House to write a three-novel series called *The Everstone Chronicles*.

Her first book, *The Hesitant Heiress*, was

released in August. *The Hesitant Heiress* has been in the Top 100 Christian historical romance books on Amazon.com since it released and is No. 4 on Amazon’s Most Wished For in Historical Christian Romance.

“Honestly, being a ‘published author’ feels just like being a ‘writer who writes,’” Dawn said. “It still feels strange when someone tells me they’ve either bought or already read my book. I’m so used to it being mine, a personal possession. And now it can literally be anyone’s.”

Dawn’s second book, *The Bound Heart*, was released November 3. The final book in the series, *The Captive Imposter*, will be available in February 2015. For updates, follow her blog at dawnrandall.blogspot.com.

Dr. Jordan-Long Retires to Teach High School

Dr. Pam Jordan-Long g78 transitioned with about 100 students and a handful of faculty and staff to Taylor University in 2009.

“It was difficult for Taylor Fort Wayne to close,” she said. “For the sake of the program and its students, I felt that I should say yes to the opportunity.”

Dr. Jordan-Long said she had a hard time adjusting to work on the Upland campus at first. “It got easier when my teaching assignment was based mostly in the Professional Writing department and when I became the director of C.S. Lewis and Friends.”

But she still missed teaching English classes. So, she decided to retire last spring. She now teaches English to high school seniors at Blackford High School in Hartford City, Ind. The school needed

someone to teach college-level English classes, and Dr. Jordan-Long found her place.

Dr. Jordan-Long said she misses her colleagues and the college atmosphere, but she’s being challenged in new ways.

“Going to a public school is a huge adjustment instead of being in a Christian environment. I started my career in public schools, so it’s not an unfamiliar territory, and the schedule is a lot less flexible. You go to work and stay there all day, but it keeps me young. The pace is different in the high school.”

Amidst all the changes in her life, Dr. Jordan-Long finds hope in the only One who remains constant.

“From the closing, to being in Upland, to being here, I’ve learned that God doesn’t let you down, despite your circumstances,” she said. “I’ve learned even more how crucial it is to make sense of things by relying on Him. His plans and ways are bigger than ours, but He can be trusted.”

Crime and Mystery Writing Professor Remembered

David Pierce, professor of Crime and Mystery Writing at TUFW, went home to be with the Lord on July 22, 2014, following emergency brain surgery.

David taught the class twice on the Fort Wayne campus and once on the Upland campus

and was a close friend to Dr. Dennis Hensley ha08 and beloved professor to many Professional Writing alumni.

“The students valued his patience, intelligence, and solid teaching,” Dr. Hensley said. “When he taught in Fort Wayne, he would live at our home during J-term, and I enjoyed many evenings of talking shop with him about what he was reading and writing and what my current writing projects were.”

The husband of Christian comedian Chonda Pierce, David often wrote satirical crime stories on killing his wife and burying her in the backyard, while Chonda joked on stage about David's love of Nascar racing.

Nathan Marchand g06 remembers David's “sense of humor and his love of story.” He enjoyed David's personal storytelling, especially the teasing banter between him and his wife. Nathan also remembers David's kindness.

“He held one-on-one conferences with each student, which let him get to know each of his students individually and helped them improve their stories. I loved that,” he said. “He was also kind enough to talk to me about agents when he taught again at TUFW after I graduated. And he remembered me.”

David published his crime and mystery stories in *Alfred Hitchcock* and *Ellery Queen* and published a compilation book of his stories, *It's a Crime*. He also published several nonfiction books, including *Don't Let Me Go*, *Savage*, and *To Kill A Zombie*.

Author's Note:

David Pierce corresponded with this author a couple of times through Facebook private message after she graduated—once after TUFW closed and again in 2012, when he taught the class on the Upland campus. The first time, he wanted to know what kinds of writing projects we were doing. The second time, he had asked me if my husband Keith g06 and I would be interested in reading some of his crime and mystery stories again.

I thought he was going to send us a few of his published short stories from *Ellery Queen*, but instead he sent us the whole compilation book *It's a Crime*, and two of his other books, *Don't Let Me Go* and *To Kill a Zombie*. He had autographed all three books for us. I remember David's kindness more than anything. I still don't consider myself a fiction writer, but I'll never forget how David took interest in us, his writing students.
