Stephanie grew up in New Haven, Indiana, and transferred to the Fort Wayne campus as a sophomore biblical studies major in 1990. Interestingly, her father, **Joseph Cox g93**, was then also a student on the campus, so father and daughter graduated together.

While at Summit Christian, Stephanie and Matthew Demorest g97 became good friends, and after a year of being "just friends," that friendship grew and the two were married in 1994. They welcomed their son, Zebadiah, now 16, in 2001.

After completing her Master of Arts in Religious Studies from Wake Forest University in 1999, new doors opened—first at Huntington University, where Stephanie taught the book of Romans, based on the course and excellent notes of **Dr. Wes Gerig g51**.

Stephanie also became an adjunct professor at TUFW from 2002-2009, teaching Old Testament Survey and New Testament Greek during the same years that she continued to

teach Intro to New Testament and Intro to World Religions at Huntington.

Now back at the Alumni Center since 2015, Stephanie's greatest joys are connecting with alumni through mailing cards and packages and personally encountering alumni from multiple graduation years at alumni events. ## **Grad Cares for Alumna Wife, Darline (Haller) Strader**By Kayleen Reusser fs82

"God is in control. I trust him."

hose were the last seven words

Darline (Haller) Strader g58 wrote
in May 2017, just four months before
she entered Heaven. Three years earlier, she
had been diagnosed with ALS (amyotrophic

lateral sclerosis, a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and the spinal cord). During those difficult three years, although Darline lost her ability to control her limbs, she never doubted God's goodness.

Having met at Fort Wayne Bible College,

**T.A.** Strader g60 and Darline married in 1963 and lived in various locales around the U.S. as T.A. worked with Youth for Christ. They later settled in San Antonio, Texas.

In early 2014, Darline began to lose weight. Her speech became and remained hoarse, but several months passed before she was diagnosed with ALS. The Straders were understandably shaken but chose to lean on God for strength. "We began to pray not 'why us?' but 'what for?'," said T.A.

They recalled an illustration a friend

had offered. "In situations like ours, when answers to the hardest questions are hidden, God creates a tapestry of our lives," T.A. explained. On the tapestry's back is a hodgepodge of ugly knots of every size and color. Nothing makes sense. "It's only when you turn it over that you can see what God is

doing."

The disease seemed to become the controller of their schedules as T.A. and Darline repeated trips to medical appointments and facilities. God was their constant strength.

According to

T.A., God provided them with people like Dr. Dave Player, who helped them through the physical changes. "Dave was a good friend who saw Darline and helped us work through her symptoms for a diagnosis," he said. The University of Texas Health Science Center was another blessing.

"Darline saw doctors of different disciplines all in that one setting, rather than having to go to various appointments."

In November 2015, as the disease began to attack her respiratory system, Darline was put on a ventilator. In January 2016 she lost

her ability to speak and used an Etch-A-Sketch-like device to communicate. In June 2016 she received a feeding tube.

T.A. held fast to his wedding vows. For better, for worse, in sickness and in health had been his commitment. As her principal caregiver, T.A. cleaned and changed tubes and lovingly cared for Darline's many physical needs. "Even when she didn't like something, like wearing a vent mask 24/7 and getting sores on her feet and back, she never complained," he said. "Her faith was solid all the way through."

By June 2016, Darline was placed on hospice and then in November, she was confined to bed and hospice staff joined T.A. in caring for her. The Straders' son lived next door and visited his parents daily. He provided a way for his mother to daily watch her favorite TV show, Wheel of Fortune.

When Darline passed from physical to eternal life on September 10, 2017, T.A. was by her side. His challenge goes forth to every couple: "We made vows to each other 54 years ago in sickness and in health," he said. "Every couple needs to understand what that kind of commitment means."

While it is too soon for T.A. to know exactly how his life will change, he relies on friends at his church, Wayside Chapel in San Antonio, and Christian friendships forged during his days at Fort Wayne Bible College for support.

No matter the future direction of his life, T.A. knows his faith will remain constant. "We are believers by choice," he said. "God has redeemed us and we are his children. He'll care for his children one way or another. I still have questions, but I believe in the sovereignty of God and that he doesn't make mistakes, based on Romans 8:28-29. We may not understand this side of Heaven what God is doing, but when we get to Heaven, it won't matter."

Almost by accident, T.A. was part of one of the college's most famous singing groups. **Paul Robbins g60** (first tenor), **Ed Terui g60** (second tenor), **Paul Brennan g60** (baritone), and **T.A.** (bass) were chosen by **Don Rohrs g48** to be the Crusaders Quartet.

"None of us had been assigned our obligatory Christian service requirements," he said. "We were the leftovers, but later, we represented the college during tours and were asked to sing on the radio." **Ken Mays g60** accompanied them on piano.

Over the years, the quartet reunited several times for performances, as late as 2013. "We've sung in the same churches as we did in 1958," he said. "People remarked

that they remembered us but our voices had changed."

## Ulick Cares for Marines; FWBC Friends Care for Him By Kayleen Reusser fs82

n the evening of October 22, 1983, **Brad Ulick g88** left his barracks around the Beirut International Airport in Lebanon for the command post. He went to a rooftop observation post to watch the fighting, which had started in perimeter positions, mostly by

snipers of faction groups. His unit, the 24<sup>th</sup> Marine Amphibious Unit, was due to be relieved in two months and emotions were high.

"We were happy because we were going to make it home," he said.

Brad had enlisted in the Marines in 1980. His unit was assigned to hot spots around the world to help relieve areas of trouble. For months tensions had

been high between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO). British, Italian, and French forces were also in Lebanon to maintain peace. However, conditions had continued to deteriorate with nightly firefights.

Suddenly on that October night, tracer rounds and explosions began falling hard around the area. "It was a horrific firefight," said Brad, who felt a bullet's impact in a sandbag six-inches from his head.

He took cover in a bombed-out building and fell asleep in a vacant rack rather than risking movement across an open area. Brad was awakened the next morning to a terrific explosion and felt pancaked as debris fell on top of him. He may have been knocked out as he is unable to remember how much time passed. Crawling out, he was shaken to see a fellow Marine in shock with an eye missing. Brad loaded the Marine into a jeep and took

him to an aid station located nearby.

When the surgeon asked Brad what had happened, he admitted he didn't know. "I suspected the barracks had taken a direct hit by an artillery shell," he said.

It was later determined two truck bombs had struck the separate barracks housing United States and French military forces. "I was the only Marine of my unit to survive the attack," said Brad.

The bombs caused the deaths of 220
Marines, 18 Navy sailors, and three Army
soldiers. Eighty-one Americans were injured
and 58 French troops were also killed.

The tragedy represented the single deadliest day for the United States Marine Corps since the Battle of Iwo Jima in World War II. It was also the deadliest single attack on Americans overseas since World War II. The Palestinian Islamic Jihad claimed responsibility for the bombings.

When Brad returned to the scene of the attack, he saw dead bodies everywhere. "For one guy who was still alive," he said. "I held him until he died in my arms."

Brad was assigned to identify the bodies. For four days he worked without sleep. At

one point, he found the bodies of both of his good friends.

Due to Brad's presence in the morgue, his name was not listed as a survivor. "For six days my family in Peoria, Illinois, was told I was MIA and presumed dead." he said.

In 1985 Brad was discharged from military service and enrolled at Fort Wayne Bible College (FWBC) to pursue a degree in pastoral ministry. "I needed a small, intimate campus to become human again," he said. Brad was familiar with FWBC as he had enrolled while overseas for a correspondence course in philosophy from FWBC. During the explosion in Lebanon, the materials had disintegrated.

Brad graduated from FWBC in 1988. He credits staff member Dick Baxter g70 and students Scott Liechty g86, Ron Williams g87, and Dave Gruber g85 for their support. "They listened to me and didn't judge me for being in the Marines," he said.

Brad later earned a master's degree in ministry of theology from Bethel College in Mishawaka, Indiana. Brad followed the Lord's calling and served as a police chaplain and church pastor for 20 years. However, within months of the attack, Brad began to feel chronically ill with bronchitis-related symptoms.

"A medical specialist said I had the same physical symptoms as the first responders

at the 9/11 attack," he said. The cause was thought to be the dust from buildings at the attack in Lebanon. Brad was eventually diagnosed with service-connected combat injuries and classified as disabled.

Today, his health is stable and Brad works for **Scott Holmes g89** at ABI Attachments. He and his wife, **Kim (Parker) g90**, the daughter of an Air Force veteran, are parents to two children. They live in Elkhart, Indiana.




